Carrots and parsnips must have foliage trimmed back to $7.5 \mathrm{~cm}(3 \mathrm{in})$. Peas and beans must be displayed with some stalk attached. Tomatoes must be displayed with calyces. The vegetables should be displayed within an area of $45 \times 60 \mathrm{~cm}(18 \times 24 \mathrm{in})$ without bending any part of them. The tray, board or staging must not be cut or mutilated in any way at all. No part of an exhibit should exceed the size of the tray. Parsley garnish and a black base cloth are allowed but no other foliage or accessories. Onion tops may be tied or whipped using raffia or string. Each type of vegetable carries a maximum of 20 points.

- Exhibitors are limited to one entry in each class
- Honey and wax must be from the exhibitor's apiary except the honey cake and biscuits
- Jars must be BS standard 454 g pattern with gold lacquered lids and show labels affixed 2 cm from base
- BBKA Show Rules (1994) apply

106. Two 454 g (1lb) jars liquid honey (Light, Medium or Dark).
107. Two 454 g (1lb) jars set honey (Creamed or Naturally Crystallised).
108. One standard 225 g ( 8 oz ) container of cut-comb minimum gross weight $200 \mathrm{~g}(7 \mathrm{oz})$
109. One shallow comb of honey suitable for extracting. Presented in a frame showcase glazed on both sides.
110. Three 28 g ( 1 oz ) approximate beeswax blocks, all uniform shape. Presented on a flat card in either a show case or clear plastic bag.
111. One Honey Cake made to the show recipe below. The cake is to be displayed on a plain white paper plate in a clear polythene bag.
200 g (7oz) self-raising flour, 175 g (6oz) liquid honey, 110 g (4oz) soft brown sugar, 140 g ( 5 oz ) butter or margarine, 2 medium sized eggs, 1 tablespoon of water.
Place butter, sugar, honey and water in a saucepan and heat until butter has melted, stirring all the time. When the butter has melted, remove pan from the heat and allow contents to cool to blood temperature. Gradually beat in the eggs, add sieved flour and mix until smooth (do not over mix). Turn into a greased and lined 6.5 to 7.5 inch diameter cake tin. Preheat the oven to $180 \mathrm{C} / 350 \mathrm{~F} / \mathrm{gas}$ mark 4. Bake for 1 hour, or until risen and firm to the touch. Cover the top, if necessary, to prevent browning too much. Leave to cool in the tin for 5 minutes and then turn out onto a wire rack until cool. Cooking time and temperature may vary to suit the type of oven used so have a trial run before competition day.

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112. Six honey shortbread biscuits made to the show recipe below. The biscuits are to be displayed on a plain white paper plate in a clear polythene bag.
225 g (8oz) butter, 400 g ( 14 oz ) plain flour, 50 g ( 2 oz ) honey, 50 g (2oz) light soft brown sugar.
Cream the butter and sugar together, add the honey and gradually add the shifted flour. Mix well together to form soft dough. Roll out the dough on a lightly floured surface and cut into rounds using a scone cutter, prick the surface with a fork and put on a greased baking tray. Bake in a preheated oven at 160 C/Gas 2 for approximately 25 minutes or until the biscuits are golden brown. When cooked, lift the biscuits off the tray and leave to cool on a wire rack.
113. Ten pieces of honey fudge made to the show recipe below. The pieces of fudge are to be displayed on a plain white paper plate in a clear polythene bag.
454 g (1lb) granulated sugar, 55 g (2ozs) butter, 55 g ( 2 ozs ) honey, 160 ml ( $1 / 4$ pint) milk. Put all the ingredients into a heavy based pan. Bring slowly to the boil, stirring all the time. Cover and boil rapidly for 2 minutes. Uncover and boil gently for approximately 15 minutes until soft ball stage is reached, stirring all the time. (A little dropped into cold water will form a soft ball $120 \mathrm{C} / 240 \mathrm{~F}$ ). Take off the heat, stand pan on a cold surface for 5 minutes. Beat until creamy and mix starts to thicken. Pour quickly into a greased / oiled tin approximately 7 inches square. When nearly set, mark into squares. Cut when cold.
