- Each exhibit must be entered on the Entry Form as a separate item and paid for accordingly.
- All classes are open classes, except class 142.
- Exhibitors' numbers, issued on the day, must be affixed to exhibits.
- Exhibits must be the property of the exhibitor and for classes 1-24 and 33-69, must have been grown on their property.
- Entries that do not conform to the schedule will be disqualified. Please read the schedule carefully.
- An exhibit once placed may not be moved or touched other than by the Secretary or by their official deputy. No exhibitor may move or touch the exhibit of another.
- The exhibitor's name shall not appear on any exhibit.
- Exhibits must be displayed in the marquee between 6.00 am and 10.30 am on Saturday 21 st August when the marquee will be cleared for judging.
- The Judges' decisions are final.
- No exhibit to be removed from the marquee before 4.15 pm .
- Please remove exhibits from the marquee between 4.15-4.45 pm.
- Exhibits not removed will be deemed to have been donated to show funds and may be auctioned.

Carrots and parsnips must have foliage trimmed back to 7.5 cms . Peas and beans must be displayed with some stalk attached. Tomatoes must be displayed with calyces. The vegetables should be displayed within an area of $18 \times 24$ in ( $45 \times 60 \mathrm{~cm}$ ) without bending any part of them. The tray, board or staging must not be cut or mutilated in any way at all. No part of an exhibit should exceed the size of the tray. Parsley garnish and a black base cloth are allowed but no other foliage or accessories. Onion tops may be tied or whipped using raffia or string. Each type of vegetable carries a maximum of 20 points.

106. Two $454 \mathrm{~g}(1 \mathrm{lb})$ jars liquid honey (Light, Medium or Dark).
107. Two $454 \mathrm{~g}(1 \mathrm{lb})$ jars set honey ( Creamed or Naturally Crystallised).
108. One standard $225 \mathrm{~g}(8 \mathrm{oz})$ container of cut-comb minimum gross weight 200 g (xoz)
109. One shallow comb of honey suitable for extracting. Presented in a frame show case glazed on both sides.
110. Three $28 \mathrm{~g}(1 \mathrm{oz})$ approximate beeswax blocks, all uniform shape. Presented on a flat card in either a show case or clear plastic bag.
111. One Honey Cake made to the show recipe below. The cake is to be displayed on a plain white paper plate in a clear polythene bag.
$225 \mathrm{~g}(8 \mathrm{oz})$ SR flour, $175 \mathrm{~g}(6 \mathrm{oz})$ honey, $115 \mathrm{~g}(4 \mathrm{oz})$ butter or marg, $175 \mathrm{~g}(6 \mathrm{oz})$ sultanas, 2 medium eggs, pinch of salt, a little milk.
Toss sultanas in a little of the flour, cream fat with honey, beat eggs and add alternately with sifted flour and salt, mix well, adding a little milk if necessary, fold in sultanas. Bake at 180C/350F/gas 4 in 7 ins round tin for approx $1 \frac{1}{4}$ hours.
112. Six honey crunch biscuits made to the show recipe below. The biscuits are to be displayed on a plain white paper plate in a clear polythene bag.
$55 \mathrm{~g}(2 \mathrm{oz})$ butter, $55 \mathrm{~g}(2 \mathrm{oz})$ plain flour, 1 tablespoon honey, $55 \mathrm{~g}(2 \mathrm{oz})$ granulated sugar, $85 \mathrm{~g}(3 \mathrm{oz})$ rolled oats, $1 / 2$ teaspoon bicarbonate of soda.
Melt the butter and honey together, take off heat and add bicarbonate of soda. In a bowl put flour, sugar and oats. Mix in the liquid mixture and allow to cool slightly. Put knobs of the mixture onto a greased baking sheet and flatten slightly. Bake at $160 \mathrm{C} / \mathrm{xxxF} /$ gas 4 for approximately 15 minutes.
